**Title:** Knowing God in His Omnipotence

**Text:** Job 26:6-14

**Theme:** The perfection of God's power

**One:** A Definition of God's Omnipotence

- A working definition: God can do anything...he pleases
- A deeper distinction: absolute vs. ordinate
- A biblical term: almighty
- The divine inability = God cannot contradict his nature






**Two:** Some examples of God's Omnipotence

- God's power in creation
- God's power in miracles
- God's power in judgment
- God's power in salvation

**Three:** The experience of God's Omnipotence

- The gospel for salvation
- The process of sanctification
- The assurance of glorification
